Copeland, PhD,BCBA-D, Regents' Professor, Department of Special Education, College of Education and Human Sciences, University of New Mexico, Mr. Sanath Jayalath, Director, Bilingual Education of the Ministry of Education, Dr. Udena R Attygalle, Consultant Child and Adolescent Psychiatrist, Sirimavo Bandaranaike Specialized Children hospital Peradeniya and Mrs. Nirmali



Wickremesinghe, innovative educationist and Consultant, Gateway Group of Schools. The discussion was moderated by Rear Admiral Dimuthu Gunawardena RWP**, RSP, VSV, USP, nswc, psc, hdmc, Acting Director General and Director (Communications and Publications) of the Institute of National Security Studies. The audience consisted of Ministry officials, policymakers, academicians, principals, researchers, representatives from Sri Lankan armed forces and Sri Lanka Police. Final speaker of the event was Mrs. Nirmali Wickremesinghe and she made a lively presentation on parental nurturing of children and its importance. Aftermath of the three presentations, the moderator opened the floor for the Q and A discussion which was fruitful and informative. The event was conducted on a request made by the Ministry of Education as many education institutions named "Boarding schools' are reported to be mushrooming, which provide in-house accommodation for children and fast track primary and secondary education by making them sit for competitive government examinations at ages much younger than the normal age groups of children who sit for such examinations in Sri Lanka.

The event was held at the auditorium of the Faculty of Graduate Studies, General Sir John Kotelawala Defence University, Kandawala Estate, Ratmalana. Hon. Ranil Wickremesinghe, the President of the Democratic Socialist

Republic of Sri Lanka graced the occasion as the Chief Guest. The conference was attended by ministry officials, military officers, law enforcement agencies, researchers, academics from state universities, think tanks, and senior experts from across the country.









The event commenced with the lighting of the traditional oil lamp, the national anthem and a welcome dance performed by the cultural troop of Sri Lanka Navy which was followed by a documentary video of the Institute, its history and various facets of national security threats that Sri Lanka had undergone throughout the history. This was followed by a welcome speech delivered by the Acting Director General of the institute, Rear Admiral Dimuthu Gunawardena, RWP**, RSP, VSV, USP, ndc, hdmc, psc highlighting the fact that the national security of the 21st century has taken many dimensions other than military security. After a message sent by Secretary to the Ministry of Defence General Kamal Gunaratne (Retd.) WWV RWP RSP USP ndc psc MPil was read out to the audience, the President, Hon. Ranil Wickremesinghe was then invited to the podium to address the gathering and delivered a comprehensive speech on the national security challenges in the 21st century. The chief guest stressed the necessity to address the national and global level national security concerns which may have a security concern to Sri Lanka. He further thanked and appreciated the effort taken by the staff of INSS to organize this conclave which enables to promote the research studies related to national security in Sri Lanka.

Subsequent to the inauguration ceremony, the first session, under the theme of "Elimination of Corruption for a Prosperous, Secure and Stable Sri Lanka," was moderated by Major General Udaya Perera (Retd) RWP RSP VSV USP USAWC M.Sc. (IND)M.Sc.(USA) NDU-CT (USA) psc (SL) psc (IND), Group Head of Administration, Brandix Lanka Ltd. The three speakers of this session were Mr. S. Ranugge, Former Secretary to the Ministry of Export Development and International Trade and Visiting Lecturer at the University of Colombo, Sri Jayewardenepura, Open University of Sri Lanka, and Sri Lanka Institute of Development Administration. Mr. Ranugge critically discussed "Creating a Change in Administrative Systems and the Public Service Culture to Eliminate Corruption," which enables to define corruption from a broad perspective. Mr. Sarath Jayamanne, PC, former Director-General of the Commission to Investigate Allegations of Bribery and Corruption, spoke on "The Need for Vibrant and Efficacious Laws and Independent and Efficient Law Enforcement" based on the significance of laws in preventing corruption in Sri Lanka. Hon. Justice Yasantha Kodagoda, PC, Justice

of the Supreme Court of Sri Lanka, deliberated on "Maintenance of the Rule of Law and Efficient and Effective Administration of Justice to Combat Corruption," which signified the importance of an independent justice system to eliminate corruption in Sri Lanka.

The Second Session, themed "Climate, Cyber and Technology: Changing Dimensions in Security," was moderated by Dr. Thesara Jayawardane, Senior Lecturer and Head of





the Department of Industrial Management, University of Moratuwa. Three speakers of this session were Senior Prof. Deepthi Wickremesinghe, Department of Zoology and Environment Science, University of Colombo, who discussed "Climate Change: Immediate Global Action in this Crucial Decade," which highlights the impact of climate change as a global, national security challenge. Mr. Indika De Zoysa, Strategic Advisor/Vice President, Huawei Technologies Lanka Co.,(Pvt) Ltd, spoke on "Improving Cyber Resilience and Rapid Response to Enhance Cyber Security,". In his presentation

he mentioned how data has become the fuel in the new world and the importance of readiness and resilience. The third speaker, Senior Prof. Ajith de Alwis, FNASSL, BSc Eng (Hons) Moratuwa, MBA, (PIM-Sri J), Ph.D. (Cambridge), Senior Professor of Chemical and Process Engineering, University of Moratuwa, discussed on "Technologies, Integrated Data, and Analytical Tools for Decision Making". In his presentation he finely portrayed how Artificial Intelligence (AI) is taking over jobs of people and the future in a world of AI.





The third and final session was themed "Geopolitics in the New World Era" and was moderated by Dr. Harinda Vidanage, Head of the Department of Strategic Studies at KDU. Three speakers for this session included Ambassador Bernard Goonetilleke, Chairman of Pathfinder Foundation, Sri Lanka, who delivered a presentation titled "Russia Vs. Ukraine War: Insights and Analysis," which emphasized the effects of global security threats to Sri Lanka. Ambassador Ravinatha Aryasinghe, Former Secretary to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Former Ambassador to the USA, UN in

Geneva, Belgium, Luxembourg, and the EU, who deliberated upon the "Power Struggle in the Indo-Pacific Region: Implications for Sri Lanka," where he highlighted the crucial role played by Sri Lanka amidst the power struggle in the Indo-Pacific Region. Finally, Professor Chaminda Padmakumara, Head of the Department of International Relations at the University of Colombo, discussed "Sri Lanka's Significance in South Asia's Initiatives for Foreign Cooperation," . His presentation gave a South Asian aura for the audience which





highlighted how international cooperation can be enhanced further.

The one-day workshop successfully concluded with a certificate-awarding ceremony.



Renewable Energy; Securing the Present and the Future of Sri Lanka

Today, Sri Lanka is in the face of a burning economic crisis. This major crack in the economy has led to serious national security concerns including the energy sector. With the disruption of the day-to-day lives of people, the energy insecurity has imposed threats to other sectors such as education, health, transportation, food etc. With these issues, Sri Lanka needs to understand the importance of the renewable energy transition and capacity building.

Sri Lankan energy supply is dominated by three major components; 41% by petrol, 46% by biomass and 13% by electricity. Although the energy produced by electricity is low, it is counted as the most impactful component, since it is strongly intertwined with the daily lives of the people. In Sri Lanka, electricity is generated using three primary sources: thermal power (which includes coal and fuel oil), hydropower, and other non-conventional renewable energy sources (solar power and wind power). The usage of coal and oil in thermal power generation has faced a huge crisis, because the economic crisis has disrupted the import of these components. The significance of renewable energy for the present and future of Sri Lanka has been unveiled with these developments.

Entwining of Energy Security and National Security

Energy becomes a national security issue when energy insecurity affects a country's governing policies and the security of the people. Current energy crisis has directly affected the day-to-day lives of the citizens. Revealing the seriousness of the situation, the country is facing electricity cuts, and long petrol and diesel queues in gas stations have become a common sight. Gas shortage has closed down a large number of restaurants thus far. The tourism sector had a mini-boom in the beginning of February 2022, but yet again severely affected due to the power outages. Hospitals are facing a critical situation and online education has been hampered. It is obvious that the security threat posed by the energy insecurity has spilled over to transportation, health, food, education and many other sectors creating a detrimental effect.

The international factors like, the dependency of oil from the international market imposes national security threats on Sri Lanka. The reliance on the production and transportation of fossil fuels creates national vulnerabilities since the importing country can be influenced by the regulations made by the exporting countries. Not to mention, burning fossil fuels contributes to climate change; yet another aspect of national



 $security. These factors have \ revealed \ the importance \ of \ moving \ towards \ renewable \ energy, \ rather \ than \ surviving \ on \ coal \ \& \ oil \ for \ energy \ production.$

Sri Lanka and Renewable Energy Policies

The government has given prominence to the renewable energy sector through the current policies. The plan is to increase the power generation capacity of the country from the existing 4,043 megawatts (MW) to 6,900 MW by 2025 with a significant increase in renewable energy. The government is striving to increase the contribution of renewable energy to 70% to the national grid by the year 2030, which is a very effective target. Sri Lanka has already achieved a grid connectivity of 98 percent, which is relatively high by South Asian standards.

Hydropower in the country has almost reached its capacity and produces a fluctuating amount of energy due to less predictable weather patterns. As a result, the authorities have plans to add additional renewable and non-renewable power plants over the next 10 years. The construction of a liquefied natural gas (LNG) plant was initiated in 2021 in Kerawalapitiya, identifying the increasing energy need.

Among the renewable energy projects, 'Soorya Bala Sangramaya' is one of the most efficient one that take solar power into the public domain. Making awareness on solar energy, empowering houses, religious places, factories, tourist hotels and other infrastructure, providing relevant technology is done under this program. On a different note, Sri Lanka's first large scale Wind Farm in Mannar which is expected to generate 400 GWh of electricity annually is a huge achievement by the authorities, motivating the renewable power generation.

Way Forward

In the near future, gradual depletion of oil and coal will disable the thermal power generation. Also, depending on fossil fuels make Sri Lanka's foreign expenditure increase, impacting on the economic security. Therein, development of other energy sources must be improved and the capacity of renewable power sectors must be increased. Since the establishment of the Norochcholai power plant in 2013, there were no other power plants established which could generate a considerable amount of electricity to the national grid. Currently Sri Lanka is experiencing the repercussions of it. Hence, it is vital to invest in advanced renewable energy power plants to safeguard the energy security of the country.

Contribution of people equally matters in this transformation to renewable energy. The government must educate the people on the advantages and the benefits of the transformation. Encouraging people to individually move on to renewable sources like solar energy must be done and in doing so the government must give the proper assistance, guidance and concessions. Further, diversifying our energy sources on a national level will be a good move to counter future threats and will help in insulating from supply shocks. Sri Lanka being an island nation, the potential of tidal power generation must be taken into consideration. More research and development must take place to identify the potential of it. On a concluding remark the current developments clearly denote that the future of power generation lies in the context of renewable energy. Therefore, it is crucial to address energy security in the context of renewable energy to ensure national security in the country.
